Jesse J Gregg, Jr passed away on October 4, 2017 at the age of 94. Jesse was born on November 3, 1922 in Birmingham, Alabama. Jesse served in the 980th Signal Service Company of the United States Army during <u>World War</u> <u>II</u>. His service included establishing radio

communications from the Eiffel Tower and during the D-Day Normandy invasion. Following his discharge in 1946, Jesse returned to Birmingham and soon met the love of his life, Mary Louise Hayes, at a Sunday School class meeting. They married on July 24, 1949 and remained constant companions for over 68 years. Jesse began working for the US Government in 1951. In 1959, while employed by the US Treasury Department, he was selected as part of the inaugural training class in preparation for the installation of computers within this branch of the government. The following years saw the family living in Washington, DC and Chicago areas and Jesse traveling as he then trained other personnel and supervised installation of computer systems across the United States. Jesse retired as Deputy Director of the Austin Disbursing Center in 1981. After retirement, Jesse and Louise moved to Bastrop, TX where they built their forever home. Working for 18 months, they physically built their home from the ground up. Jesse was a kind, soft spoken man who always had the right words of wisdom! Above all, Jesse loved his family. He is survived by his wife, Louise Haves Gregg; his daughter, Sheila Gregg Kothmann; his grandson, William Wade Kothmann and granddaughter-in-law, Vani Pariyadath; his granddaughter, Kara Loren Kothmann; and great granddaughter, Leia William Kothmann. Jesse was preceded in death by his parents; his brother, Edward (Eddie) Gregg; his sister, Lucille Yeager Sheffield; and his son-in-law, Don William Kothmann. Services were held on Monday, October 9th at 3:00 pm at Beck Funeral Home, Round Rock. Visitation was immediately prior to the service. A private burial followed.

Boiler Replacement: We

have received commitments for around half the cost of the new HVAC unit for our sanctuary, so with cooler temperatures right

New Lights:

Thanks to a program through the City of Austin, which pays 80% of the upfront



cost, we have completed the change out of all our lights to LED bulbs, which are just as bright but use less energy than either incandescents or CFLs. They should also need less changing. The Trustees estimate that the "payback" on this program (the time when we begin saving more money than what it initially cost us) should begin early next year.



New Chairs: The Austin Ukulele Society has purchased 100 new chairs for use in the gym. They are still traditional folding

chairs, but these are padded! Come and try them out at our Potluck luncheon on November 19.

Shifting the

Driveway: The City of Austin has been working with the Trustees and the neighborhood to come up with a solution for the traffic jam



that has been created because of the way our entrance drive doesn't line up with Wheless Dr. One of the potential solutions is that the City of Austin would pay to have our drive relocated and aligned with Wheless in addition to adding a left-hand turn lane at that intersection. Gym Work: If you haven't seen the work we've been doing in the gym, you're in for a treat! Tarrytown UMC, in service to the space that the FreeStore is using, has removed the carpet panels and freshly painted all of the bare walls in the gym. There are still plans for adding back some durable sound absorbing panels and painting the paneling as well as doing some work on the floor, but we are thankful for the commitment to the FreeStore as well as the help to us and all of the programs that take place in our gym!





2017 Charge Conference November 9th 7pm Parlor

Each year in the fall, Memorial UMC has a charge conference. The purpose of this yearly meeting is to gather the leadership in the congregation to celebrate accomplishments over the past year and make plans for the next. It is one of those "Methodist" things, and occasionally, it's good for us to publish more information for those who are not as familiar with the UMC.

Who is involved in a charge conference?

The stated leadership (in our system, the Church Council and some other named committee positions) has voice and vote at a charge conference. ANY professing member or constituent of a church can come to a charge conference and observe, but only the leadership has voice and vote. Sometimes a charge conference is turned into a church conference, the difference being that the eligibility to vote moves from just the leadership of the church to the entirety of the membership. In a church conference, any professing member also has voice and vote. Our meeting this year will be a charge conference.

The meeting is usually overseen by a District Superintendent or another elder. Sometimes several charge conferences are held together in a cluster. Often, this is to allow churches to learn what each other are doing, to encourage one another and to foster collaboration and connection. Our charge conference last year was held in a cluster of Eastside United Methodist churches from Austin. Our charge conference this year will be a single conference held on November 7 at 7:00pm in the parlor.

What happens at a charge conference?

Sometimes significant votes are taken about major projects in the church. For example, when the church decided to put in screens and allocate the money for our upgraded audio-visual systems, a vote was held at a charge conference.

In addition, we accept reports from the Membership Secretary, Trustees, Finance, Staff-Parish Relations Committee and the Pastor. Any other committee, working group, or task force may also have a report entered into the charge conference packet. We vote on candidates for ministry and authorize people to be lay speakers as well.

We also often get a chance to hear about new initiatives that are being worked on at the district or conference level. This is a great time to find out more about how United Methodists are working together across a wide region of South Texas. It also gives us a chance to think about how we will work as a congregation either on the issues in our mission field or with other congregations on a wider set of issues across several mission fields.

Finally, we always have an opportunity to pray and sometimes have a time of worship. Gathering together to pray, not just on Sunday morning, but in the context of making decisions for our future, is powerful. God reminds us that we are not just another business, but we are the Body of Christ, the church. Our meetings may be run with something like Robert's Rules of Order, but we are brought together and stay together and work together and worship together because of Jesus Christ.

We hope you will consider attending our charge conference this year!



¹⁴ What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵ If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶ and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷ So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead. James 2:14-17

After seventeen years of ministry, you would think that I would have everything figured out. But after speaking with folks who have been doing it twice as long as me, there is <u>no</u> point where you get it right every time.

I am afraid of wrong answers, so much so that I sometimes get paralyzed by over-analyzing a problem, trying to figure out the optimal answer that takes everything that I know or can guess into account. But sometimes things are unknowable. I don't know what the story is of the guy on the corner, looking for change. I don't know the story of the person that walks in brand new to the church. I don't even know all the stories of every single member of this church (though I know quite a few) or all the stories of this 144-year-old congregation (though I learn more just about every day)! To carry perfect knowledge about all of that would be impossible.

And so sometimes I have internal conversations which go back and forth, trying to figure out what the next right step is, and I get stuck on what that should be. More decisions come up, and I get behind.

This verse from James' letter reminds me that sometimes it's better just to make the best move I know how instead of trying to wait for the perfect knowledge to come. Which means sometimes I mess up...and sometimes I find that I had too high a bar for what the perfect response was. Some of the moments of ministry where I've felt God most present lately have been when I've risked doing something and getting it wrong rather than waiting to see if I can get to a perfect response.

I have been trying to do this more and more, and though there have been times I have had to apologize for mistakes I made, I am discovering that the greater mistake would have been to sit and wait for some other sign or some other knowledge. The best thing to do right now is to show someone that I care, or to speak out against injustice or things that are wrong. To be present and to remind others of God's presence...and to understand that even in the midst of being a minister, God is ministering to me as well.

There is a reason that our bulletin lists everyone in the congregation as a minister of the Gospel. It is because this is actually the task of each of us. And yes—EVERY one of us will make mistakes at it. The pastor is no exception! But if we fear being wrong so much that it hinders us from doing anything, then where is our faith leading us? I continue to pray that my own faith and the faith of everyone at Memorial UMC will give them boldness to speak up for the Good News—and to be kind and healing in a broken world.

November is Stewardship Emphasis Month!

Beginning November 5, we will be hearing from members of Memorial UMC who will be speaking in worship about why they give. We hope and pray that it will be an inspiring time and draw you closer to God as well as to our community. We will celebrate all that God has provided for us over this last year as well as the return of our Estimate of Giving cards for 2018 at our polluck luncheon on November 19.

As we talk about our giving and what it helps this congregation to accomplish, here are the answers to a couple of frequently asked questions people have about giving in a church (adapted from resources for *Enough*, a stewardship program developed by the UMC Church of the Resurrection):

Why is giving important? The Bible has much to say about wisdom and finances, with 2,300 verses that tell us to be generous and good stewards of our resources. Jesus taught generosity and sacrifice. He demanded that his followers serve not wealth but God, and in the parable of the talents he taught that God will hold us each accountable for what we do with all our earthly possessions.

What does God expect of me?

The Bible teaches us to give a tithe, or the first 10% of what we earn, to God and the church's work. For some, giving one tenth is a very difficult goal. For others, it is the starting point, and their giving far exceeds 10%. The important thing is that you start somewhere, that your giving reflects an appropriate offering to God given your means, and that your offerings express both your desire to serve the Lord and your investment in God's work. Our prayer is that everyone will grow in his or her faith through giving financially to the ministries of the church. as God gives us the ability.

What if financial hardship won't let me make a commitment this year?

Don't let your inability to give at this time keep you from worship. **Remember that God honors your faithfulness and that your acceptance at Memorial UMC is not based upon your capacity to give.** We ask that everyone return an estimate of giving card even if it is a small amount or even nothing. You can always increase or decrease your commitment by calling the church if your situation changes. Also, be sure to let our pastoral staff know of your situation so that they can pray for and support you during any difficulty.
